
## **Financial assistance**



**THE TOWN** council is committed to supporting the vital work of local groups and charities and this year made grants totalling £28,000.

Successful applicants received their awards at the Annual Town Meeting held in March at the Murray Hall.

Those included Cruse Bereavement Care (£350), Epping Forest Reuse (£350), 7th Epping Forest Scouting Group (£1,000), ignite (£200), Loughton Methodist Church (£1,500 towards the Creative Loughton Festival), Loughton Youth Project (£4,000), New Vistas (£300), Reindeer Explorer Scout Unit (£500), Restore (£4,000 towards the community centre running costs, £1,250 for the Friday night open youth club and £900 for the Noah's Ark Toddler Group). Revitalise Respite Holidays (£800 for respite breaks), Samaritans of Redbridge (£400), Spark (£700 for youth work), St Clare Hospice (£600), Loughton Festival (£2,000), Trinity Methodist Church (£700 to assist with setting up a new parent and toddler group) and Voluntary Action Epping Forest (£750). Epping Forest District Citizens Advice Bureau. now resident in Loughton Library, received a grant of £8,000 towards its running costs.

**IT WAS** with deep sadness that the town council announced the death of cllr Ken Angold-Stephens who passed away after a brave battle with cancer on 8 April 2016.

Ken joined the town council after the May 2004 elections representing the residents of Roding Ward. He served as Loughton town mayor for the year 2009/10. He was also a member of Epping Forest District Council serving as its chairman in 2011/12.

The dignity, courage and positivity with which he faced his terminal illness were the qualities associated with Ken in his working life.

Ken was instrumental in creating the Memorial Rose Garden in Roding Road, next to St Michael's Church. The garden had been open to the public since the 1960s but became overgrown during the 1990s. Thanks to Ken's dogged persistence during the many years of negotiation, planning and fundraising, it was restored to its former glory in 2014 and now serves as a fitting memorial to his devotion and hard work for the local community.

All our thoughts are with his wife, Jill and his family at this very sad time.

Town mayor, cllr Judy Jennings paid tribute to Ken saying, "He was someone to look up to and emulate in his role as a councillor and you could always rely on him for good information and advice when needed. He will be a great loss not only to his family but to the town as well".

## Civic Service, held at the Loughton Methodist Church (LMC) in February, was organised by town mayor, cllr Judy Jennings. One of Judy's interests this past year had

One of Judy's interests this past year had been the provision of arts in Loughton and so her theme for the service, "creation and inspiration" was particularly appropriate.

Readings on this theme were given by cllr Stephen Murray and Matthew Tinker, member of the UK Youth Parliament. Peter Relph from the Forest Creative Writers read one of his own poems, "Keeping Culture Alive".

Music during the service included the popular anthem "Power in Me" performed by the St John Fisher Catholic Primary School choir led by teacher, Kathryn Poulter. Members of Harlow Brass Band, of which the town mayor is a member, accompanied the hymns. Judy's sisterin-law, Glenna Parry sang the musical interlude, Only Heavenly Music from Stella Natalis by Karl Jenkins, accompanied by Roy Frost on solo trumpet.

We are particularly grateful to both Revd Oseias Da Silva from LMC and Revd Nina Coulthard, from St Michael's, for leading the service.

One of the highlights of this annual service is the presentation of the Citizenship Awards, an opportunity to celebrate Loughton's wonderful community spirit and some of the people that make a difference in our town. This award scheme is now in its 8th year and we are delighted that there are still plenty of worthy nominations from amongst our residents.

This year Michael Chapman, the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Essex, made the presentations.

Our congratulations go to Diane Rhodes, the winner of the 2016 citizenship award. Diane has dedicated her life to the service of the local community and has spent over three decades helping to make Loughton a better place to live.

Her involvement has been wide ranging - from leading a campaign to "save the conker tree" in the High Road to creating the thriving Loughton Arts Centre in 2011 run entirely by volunteers. The centre is part of the Lopping Hall complex and aims to increase the profile of the visual arts in Loughton.

A founder member of the Loughton Residents Association in 1981, she later served as a district councillor for 12 years but it is for her extensive community work that she received this honour.

The second award was presented to Adam Taylor who was chosen as the Young Citizen of the Year 2016. Adam had been nominated for his exceptional service to young people and his commitment to the Scout Association where



he has been an active member since the age of 4. Now, aged 21 and despite being in full time education, he has become the youngest adult leader to complete training in over a decade within the district.

He serves on the 1st Chigwell and Chigwell Row Scout Group Executive Committee and the District Executive Committee – the only person under 25 years old to hold these roles. He's also a Queen's scout and a Duke of Edinburgh Team Leader, mentoring young people through the award levels. Adam has also completed a range of fundraising projects from bag packing to marathons, raising over £15,000 within the past 5 years.

The third and final award was made to Monty Juniper for his lifetime service to the town and its people.

Monty was born in Loughton in 1921 and after many years living in Alderton Way, he and his wife have recently moved to North Weald to be near his family.

As a young man he served in the Territorial Army from 1937 and was mobilised for war service in 1939. Despite the war he married Dorothy Fenn in 1942 and they have now been together for over 70 years.

Monty had many varied roles in the community. He was active in the Loughton branch of the Royal British Legion becoming their welfare secretary and was always to be seen on Remembrance Day. His volunteering work included ten years with the Citizens Advice Bureau. Monty has chosen the Loughton branch of the CAB as his charity to receive a £250 cheque. He also worked with Victim Support for four years.

Monty served as a local councillor for many years. First in the 1950s as a member of the Chigwell Urban District Council and then as one of the founder members of Loughton Town Council from 1996. During his term of office he served as chairman of the council from 1998 – 1999 before standing down, aged 83, in 2004. He also served as a Justice of the Peace for some 25 years from the late 1960s.

A collection during the service raised £350 for one of the town mayor's charities, the Lopping Endowment, a trust which looks after the Lopping Hall.

**THE LIFE** of renowned author Ruth Rendell was honoured when a blue heritage plaque was unveiled in February at 45 Millsmead Way, Loughton. Ms Rendell lived at this address from 1951. It was here that she began her illustrious writing career publishing over sixty thriller novels and creating well known characters including Inspector Wexford.

Ruth Rendell was awarded a Commander

of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) in the 1996 Birthday Honours and made a life peer as Baroness Rendell of Babergh. She also wrote a series of novels under the pseudonym Barbara Vine.

Her son Simon Rendell and grandson Phillip visited from the States for the unveiling ceremony, which was led by our town mayor, cllr Judy Jennings, with other local dignitaries.



#### Supporting independent living by Martine Wartnaby, Community Agent Epping Forest

**THE NEW** Community Agents service in the Epping Forest district aims to help the over 65s remain independent in their own home. There are currently three part-time community agents covering the district offering free short term assistance.

People can refer themselves or the service can be accessed via GPs or other health professionals such as physiotherapists, community matrons, friends and family, as long as the person in question is aware that this is happening.

We are also recruiting volunteers to help us widen the service once our initial visit and support has taken place. Many people who are housebound or isolated due to location or lack of transport just need a friendly face to visit once a week. Training will be provided.

Once referred, we visit as soon as possible to assess in the home and can signpost and refer on.

# Annual Report 2016

am pleased to start my report by confirming we have met many of our main targets – the refurbishment of the popular and well used Traps Hill play area is now scheduled for June; we have added some of the missing names of fallen servicemen from the town to the war memorial on Kings Green; and we will soon be saying goodbye to our home at Buckingham Court as an office move to the library is planned. This will ultimately save on operational costs and provide a more central location for residents by creating a community hub with more services available under one roof. It should also secure the future of the library in Loughton.

Communication is everything these days and we continue to publish our quarterly newsletter Think Loughton as this also provides an ideal vehicle to support the work of local groups and charities by publicising their activities. Our website, originally created in 1997, is finally being replaced with a new design from April.

Our future plans include major improvements to the Roding Valley Recreation Ground, in particular the football changing rooms, which are in need of a face lift and the car park area. Our plans include a café and toilet to improve facilities for visitors to this lovely area. We are of course very protective of all our green spaces across the town and continue to monitor the work of the district council closely as they prepare the new draft Local Plan. I will, however, allow the committee chairmen to provide you with more details of our plans.

I have enjoyed being a hands-on mayor this year as it has given me the opportunity to serve the community in a variety of ways. I've been involved in activities such as cleaning and painting the milestones on Loughton's roads as part of the Clean for the Queen event, planting a tree in the community orchard, meeting the bees at their new apiary in Roding Road Allotments, serving teas to senior citizens at the LiberTea event in The Broadway and encouraging the contestants in the "It's a Knockout" event on Jessel Green. Part of my role has been to represent the council at important ceremonies including those hosted by the City of London, Epping Forest District Council and other neighbouring councils. I have also attended many local charitable events including those organised by St Clare Hospice, Chigwell Riding Trust, Abbeyfield Society, Loughton Voluntary Care and the Restore Centre.

Other pleasurable events have included presentations to the winners of several town council competitions including awards for the Best Allotment, Christmas cards and Christmas windows. In February I unveiled a blue heritage plaque in memory of Ruth Rendell, the author of the famous Inspector Wexford detective stories. In July I hosted a ceremony to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the falling of the first bomb in the London Civil Defence area and the dedication of a beautiful new planter in The Drive. November saw the unveiling of a new orientation board at the top of York Hill. Also in November I attended the annual Remembrance parade and service, and a moving ceremony to dedicate a new bronze plaque with four new names on the war memorial on King's Green. In December I switched on the Christmas lights in the Broadway and Loughton High Road and had an exciting carriage ride with Santa. I also lit the first candle on the menorah at the Hanukkah celebration on Standard Green.

The annual Civic Service was held in February at the Loughton Methodist Church, during which I awarded Loughton Citizen of the Year to Diane Rhodes and Young Citizen of the Year to Adam Taylor. Full details of this event may be found in the summer 2016 edition of Think Loughton.

I think it very important for the mayor to be involved with local schools and I have continued this tradition by attending events at Oak View School. We have held mock council meetings for the pupils of St John Fisher Catholic Primary School in which they were able to play the roles of councillors and learn about the council's responsibilities. I have also made presentations at Epping Forest College, the Jack Petchey's Speak Out Challenge, the Yes Partnership Motivation Conferences and the Epping Forest Investors in Young People Business Awards.

Finally, with the elections in May so comes the end of the four-year term of this council. I take this opportunity to say "thank you" to my fellow councillors for their hard work and commitment during this time. I would also extend special thanks to the town clerk and her staff for their support and kindness, and their efficiency in organising many of the events I have mentioned.

### **Planning & Licensing**

#### **Cllr Jill Angold-Stephens**

he last year has seen a marked increase in the work of this committee with 13 of our 19 meetings running well over the 2 hours laid down in our standing orders. The number of planning applications has increased from some 315 last year to 406 this year.

We are seeing a larger number of extensions to properties as families find it more expensive to move within the town or district. Wherever possible we try to support such applications whilst always taking into account the effect on neighbours and the streetscene. As well as these applications, we have seen a number of amendments, revisions and additions to plans already submitted. We have also attended a number of appeals, being represented by me, my vice-chairman or the planning clerk, dependent on our availability; as expected some have produced a successful outcome for the town and others for the developer. We feel it is important for us to attend whenever possible but sometimes at site visits we are prevented by the inspector from speaking.

On two occasions we have been invited by the district council to submit ideas for names of new buildings; once of what is now called Sovereign Place by the developer, but our suggestions were ignored as the developer had already put up hoardings announcing the name. The second time for the 2 blocks of flats to be built in Burton Road where our suggestions are under consideration.

The town council has also successfully designated Loughton as a neighbourhood plan area. The plan, once completed should enable us to have better control over what and where development occurs in the future. Our work in trying to register the precious green spaces in Debden, currently with Essex County Council, has provided useful evidence for the neighbourhood plan. We are watching with interest the district council's work on the Local Plan but this is now not due for completion until the end of 2017 at the earliest.

In all this work the committee has been ably supported by the planning clerk, Vivienne Messenger who works so hard to keep on top of everything including the large number of matters for enforcement that we bring to her attention at each meeting. I wish to record our thanks to her. I would also like to thank cllr Carol Davies who has been a valued vice-chairman for me, cllr Phil Abrahams who takes us through the projected plans at each meeting and all my fellow committee members for their thoughtful contributions to the consideration of each set of plans so that our decisions are for what is appropriate for our town.

Finally, we are very pleased to present the 2016 LTC award for building design to the architect of the new extension at Staples Road Primary School. Almost all the local primary schools have needed to increase their size in the last few years to accommodate the growing number of children of school age in the town and we know that we will soon need to increase the size of our secondary schools. It is very gratifying to see that the architect for Staples Road Primary School has been able to produce an extension that meets the needs of the school whilst maintaining the period feel and its empathy with the forest opposite.

### Recreation Cllr David Wixley

start my report by mentioning 5 awards received from the Essex Playing Fields Association. The playground at Monksgrove received a silver award while those at Colebrook Lane and Westall Road both received certificates of merit. The Roding Valley Recreation Ground also received a silver award and the Willingale Road Playing Field a certificate of merit.

The council has also received an award (the Acumen Wages Service Award for Community Work) for the range and number of community events held throughout the year. Examples of these events are the annual fun run, dog microchipping (in conjunction with the Dogs Trust), the community fun day on Jessel Green and Santa Comes to Town.

Future events include Park Run, and Xplorer which is a form of orienteering for children and families. We welcome the support of the district council, Intersport and Run Active in promoting these activities.

We hope that the Traps Hill playground will be a strong contender for an award in 2016 as it is soon to be refurbished following extensive public consultation

including input from a Loughton mums' group. A consultant, Maria Cook from Craigdene Ltd, has helped with this project, which is supported by a £20,000 Community Initiatives Fund grant towards the estimated cost of £80,000.

The late cllr Ken Angold-Stephens had been the driving force behind the restoration of the Memorial Garden in Roding Road. The garden is on land owned by the church from which the council has obtained a 21-year lease thus ensuring that it is kept maintained as an attractive public garden.

Work on the Willingale Road Nature Reserve by Countrycare and its volunteers has included the planting of fruit trees with the aim of developing a community orchard.

The Queen's 90th birthday was celebrated by the lighting of a beacon on



to legislation, is being introduced to address this problem.

The committee has been invited to comment on future proposals for both the Essex County Fire and Rescue Service and also the Sure Start Children's Centres.

Both the Kingsley Hall and Murray Hall, which now has a wedding licence, continue to be popular venues with positive feedback from users. A community centres working party consisting of officers and councillors meets twice a year to consider matters relating to the running and maintenance of the halls.

I thank the members of both the working party and the Recreation Committee for their contributions throughout the year with a special "thank you" to officers for their hard work and support.

The committee continues to support Skate Loughton enabling it to hold regular events at Roding Valley High School.

The committee's remit extends beyond recreation and includes matters relating to community safety and welfare so we have received presentations from Luke Lowrie of the Red Balloon Family Foundation and Nick Robinson of the Loughton Youth Project and two of its members. We also support the Epping Forest Positive Activities Group which promotes services for young people.

For older people there are plans to host a Senior Safety Day at the Murray Hall.

We send representatives to the police local community meetings and also the annual police conference organised by the Essex Association of Local Councils.

We are concerned about the danger and litter associated with the misuse of nitrous oxide (laughing gas) cylinders known as a legal high. This concern has prompted correspondence with Eleanor Laing MP who advised that a Psychoactive Substances Bill, leading to address this problem.

### **Environment & Heritage**

#### **Cllr Chris Pond**

his committee has met bi-monthly, supported by the town clerk and services manager (to whom our thanks are due) and continues to make good progress within its area of responsibility.

#### Allotments

We were pleased to run a successful annual best allotment competition again, with some very worthy prizewinners. Bee hives returned to the Roding Road site after a 25-year gap, and the new committee there has worked very effectively with council officers on improving the site. The management appointment discussions are in progress. A consortium of charitable users is interested in taking over the Pyrles Lane site as a social enterprise, and negotiations are ongoing. Continuation of the water supply there has been inserted into the outline planning permission for the adjacent development.

#### Christmas festivities

More businesses than ever decorated their windows. The lamp post decorations were again very tasteful, but perhaps did not make sufficient impact against the bright street lighting. Efforts to get Essex County Council to replace the lamp standards in the northern part of the High Road, which are too weak to support heavy decorations, again came to nothing, but our appointment of a town centres officer will, we hope, result in this dark area being enlivened for Christmas 2016.

#### Heritage issues

drinking fountain's oak The corner posts were repaired effectively by a specialist contractor. Ceremonies were held in July and November to mark the installation of a planter to commemorate the falling of the 75th anniversary of the first bomb in the London region, and the addition of further names to the war memorial. Essex Police had withdrawn their support for Remembrance Day parades across the county but folks in



Loughton handled the arrangements well.

A blue plaque was installed to commemorate Ruth Rendell at her former house in Millsmead Way in February, and one more has been agreed, awaiting the necessary permissions. There are now 38 plaques in Loughton. The 200-year old milestones in Loughton were cleaned, painted, and re-lettered in March.

#### Transport and traffic regulation orders (TRO)

The committee continues to monitor changes to local bus services particularly following ECC's tendering round and the ending of funding from Transport for London for 2016/17. We are also pressing for all-night

### **Resources & General Services** Clir Stephen Pewsey

This is the committee that oversees the finances of the town council and the standards and the quality of our public service. The committee's priority is to make sure that the precept – that part of the council tax which is allocated to Loughton Town Council – is invested wisely and used effectively in projects and services which offer really good value for money, are high quality, and which help to make our

town a better place. As town councillors we all live in Loughton, and we are all unpaid volunteers, and that is your guarantee that we are as keen as you are for Loughton to be a low-tax town which welcomes new enterprise, is a place where existing businesses can flourish, and is a great place in which to live and bring up our children.

So our main purpose is scrutiny – to make sure that every penny counts, and is not wasted but well spent, and that everything the town council does is open and transparent. We go above and beyond our very strict national audit rules in every aspect of the council's work, which is one of the reasons we are a Quality Gold accredited council and have a trophy cabinet full of other awards back in the council offices.

Thanks to this careful scrutiny, our precept - or local rate - has not

street lighting in the town with the introduction of 24-hour tube services.

Moves to ban heavy vehicles from the conservation areas and other roads near the forest edge were supported by the committee and we have commented on other schemes, some major, such as the revised road layouts following the Langston Road development. A potential TRO is sent for consultation, and the town council uses its local knowledge in commenting.

#### Footpaths

Minor modifications to footpaths near Englands Lane, and naming thereof, were agreed, and a new footpath (to be called Royal Oak Path) dedicated near the former Royal Oak Public House, Smarts Lane to Forest Road. ECC resurfaced the Shaftesbury-Forest Road path in accordance with City of London specifications. Bulb planting, in memory of former resident Dennis Jones, by Lady Mary's Path was undertaken to create a lovely spring display.

#### Flower baskets

The displays were extended along Old Station Road, but winter planting was abandoned, as they had not proved attractive.



#### Northern Gateway Access Road

I attended the public enquiry into this road proposed by the London Borough of Enfield, which we, EFDC, ECC and the Corporation of London fear would increase traffic on the A121 and A1168. The proposal, as such, was withdrawn as a result.

#### Cemetery digitisation of burial registers

This project was completed in 2015 and the burial records for Loughton Cemetery from the first burial in 1888 are now available online.

increased for the past 7 years. Residents still pay less than  $\pounds 1$  a week in a Band D property for all our services, from bus shelters to playgrounds, from blue plaques to grit bins, from community centres to tennis courts.

The committee also awards grants to help good causes; those which directly help improve life for the people of Loughton. The voluntary sector plays a vital role in our town life – and I would like to thank and pay tribute to all those who give up their time to make this town a better place. With £27,500 available in total in 2016 we have focussed our awards for Loughton's young people, through groups such as the Loughton Youth Project, playgroups and the scouts, and also on organisations which help the vulnerable elderly. We are also delighted to help support yet again the Loughton branch of the Epping Forest Citizens Advice Bureau with an £8,000 grant. This is a charity which has made such a difference to so many lives.

Finally, on your behalf, I would like to thank my hardworking fellow committee members, especially my deputy chair, Imogen Lawrence, and all the town council officers, especially the town clerk, Enid Walsh, and her deputy, Shirley Haynes, for all their work and support throughout the past year.





# Online crime reporting

AS POLICE station front counters close, Essex Police has launched new ways to report non-emergency crime, meaning that for the first time in the county crime can be rer

in the county crime can be reported online. A new website **www.essex.police.uk/** 

doitonline lets people report non-emergency crime, road traffic collisions and provides access to a range of information and advice, easily and conveniently. Online reporting for lost or found property will also become available. They have also subscribed to the national knowledge bank "Ask The Police", which is accessible on this website. Ask the Police contains answers to hundreds of often-asked questions about policing from abandoned vehicles to youth issues.

Gareth Nicholson, head of communications at Essex Police, said: "With the huge growth we've seen in people using the internet for daily tasks like shopping as well as accessing services from councils to GPs online, it's obvious that people need to be able to access police services online too. If the crime is happening now or you're in danger, we still need you to call 999, but reporting a crime or a road traffic collision can now be done more conveniently than ever before. We want people who don't need us in an emergency to think carefully about how they contact us and whether the information they're looking for is already online because that gives officers more time to fight crime."

Assistant Chief Constable Maurice Mason said: "I want to reassure people living in those towns that the commitment to keep them safe remains our absolute priority. The closure of public front counters will have no effect on our local patrols and ability to respond to calls for help. Our job is to remain at the heart of our communities, but every expensive and outdated building which isn't wellused by the public means fewer officers on patrol stopping crime and helping vulnerable people."

# Loughton Building Design Award



**THIS AWARD** was introduced by the town council in 2012 to recognise and reward individual examples of good design and construction, and to raise public awareness of the built environment within Loughton.

We look for building works completed in the previous 12 months that either:

- enhance the town;
- improve a dilapidated building;
- upgrade or enhance a conservation area; or arenoteworthy in terms of design or innovation.

This year the judges were most impressed by the new extension at Staples Road Primary School. Mark Chandler from Vincent and Gorbing Architects received the award at the Annual Town Meeting.

This attractive building uses materials that blend in well with the original part of the school. The outdoor area has also been remodelled to provide a much improved play area in what was previously a difficult site with a steep slope. The whole effect of the work gives a tasteful and attractive aspect at this focal point of the conservation area and importantly does not detract from the forest opposite the school.
