all day wristbands from £5. Book online at www.jesselgreen.org.uk for a discount.





THE TOWN council is finally on the move to its new home in Loughton Library this summer.

After protracted legal negotiations with Essex County Council I can report the lease has now been completed. Minor building works will be undertaken in the coming weeks to increase the size of the former Connexions room on the first floor of the library located next to the Citizens' Advice Bureau offices. Our apologies for any inconvenience these necessary works may cause to library users.

We hope to complete the move during July/August. As our telephone and email contact details will remain unchanged this should not disrupt the services we offer to our residents. Our existing building at Buckingham Court is to be let initially on a short-term lease. Once we have completed the move, all our regular council and committee meetings will be held in the library.

Other changes at the town council include the departure of two long-serving members of staff, Shirley Haynes and Vivienne Messenger. Shirley will be known to many of you for her work managing the

council's financial assistance scheme and the Willingale Road allotments. Vivienne clerked the regular planning and licensing committee meetings and was also responsible for collating the information for this publication. We thank them for their service and wish them well in the future.

Understandably, residents have been complaining about an increase in anti-social behaviour in the town. The two key issues have been problems and serious crimes resulting from the night time economy in the High Road and the unacceptable conduct of moped riders on our roads and green spaces. Our thanks must go to Chief Inspector Lewis Bashford and his local policing team for their proactive response to these problems.

Another problem regularly reported by residents is that of speeding traffic particularly along Oakwood Hill / Valley Hill. The Speedwatch scheme is looking for volunteers to form local groups to carry out roadside activities to improve road safety. Please contact us if you would like to be involved.

Whilst work continues by the District Council to analyse the responses to the draft Local Plan, the town council continues to promote the importance of Loughton's green spaces to the wellbeing of its residents at every opportunity. We hope you will join us on the lovely Jessel Green for the annual community fun day on Sunday 16 July form 12 noon until 4pm.

Public rights of way



TIME IS running out to ensure some of the wellused footpaths in Loughton are protected through registration as a PROW.

The government has announced that the official (definitive) maps would soon be closed against the addition of paths claimed on the basis of historic evidence.

The town council has already made an informal approach to Epping Forest District Council regarding its voluntary registration of a number of paths under its ownership. However, we need

your help to gather evidence on four other routes potentially under threat from development. These

- across Luctons Field diagonally from Ladyfields to Luctons Path
- Jacksons Alley
- Luctons Path
- adjacent 18 Longfield to Lowery Path If you have used any of these paths regularly during a 20-year period from 1994 to date, please contact the town council for an evidence form.



2017 IS a new "Year of the Chair" at Lopping Hall. The current chairs have served audiences well for over 30 years, but deserve to be retired!

The directors of the hall have already carried out a significant programme of improvements to the facilities and structure of the Hall. THANKS TO a grant from Essex County Council's Community Initiative Fund we have recently installed two outdoor table tennis tables, one each on the Roding Valley Recreation Ground and the Willingale Road Playing Field.

Records show that this popular sport was first played in England towards the end of the 19th century. Apparently, Victorians turned their dining room tables into miniature versions of the traditional lawn tennis courts and used everyday objects to replace the racquets and balls.

The game has been historically known by several different names including "Whif whaf," "Gossamer," and "Flim Flam", but whether you know it as ping pong or table tennis, why not try the outdoors experience.

Whether you are a beginner or a more experienced player, unfortunately the English weather will not always guarantee that winning stroke, but you will have fun with your friends.

If you don't have your own equipment, bats and balls are available from the town council office on payment of a returnable deposit.

Burglar alarms

RESIDENTS THROUGHOUT the county have reported receiving unsolicited telephone calls from companies who say that crime is on the increase in their area and that they are at risk. They offer to install a free or very cheap burglar alarm and claim they are working with agencies such as the Home Office, District Council or the police. This is not true.

Crime Prevention Assistant, Tony Ellis and the District Council's Community Safety Officer, Paul Gardener pointed out that most people who have been contacted by these companies have had the good sense not to allow them to visit their home but on the odd occasion, when work has been carried out, the cost to the customer has been exorbitant. One man was charged £3,000 in installation and monitoring costs.

Our advice is not to buy a security alarm from a cold caller over the telephone or at the door and don't agree to a visit.

If you feel that you have been a victim of malicious cold calling regarding home security, then contact Trading Standards on 08454 040506.

Our local crime prevention officers always welcome calls from people who want advice to keep themselves and their property secure whether it is installing an appropriate security alarm or something as simple as having proper locks fitted to your home.

Annual Report 2017

ince I was elected as Mayor last May, I have really enjoyed serving the community in Loughton. I've had the honour of being invited to attend many events for local groups and charities. I've cut ribbons and cakes, judged competitions, given out prizes, awarded certificates, presented cups and trophies, picked raffle tickets, watched very entertaining shows, performances and concerts. All in all, it's been wonderful to represent the Town Council wherever and whenever I was needed, on many joyful, as well as solemn and official occasions.

So far I've attended nearly 50 mayoral engagements! However, as space is limited, I think you may appreciate it if I don't mention them all to you in this report. Rather, I will just concentrate on three of the most notable, which were particularly memorable for me.

The first engagement was the annual Community Fun Day on our beautiful Jessel Green. Here I was charged with welcoming all the visitors and opening the proceedings. After an initial lovely Samba dance display by the pupils from Hereward and White Bridge Schools, the morning rain turned into a perfect sunny summer's day, and with all the stalls and amusements and a colourful display of amazing kites, it was a really wonderful family event.

Another memorable engagement was the opening of the Pyrles Lane Community Garden and Picnic, where I was invited by the GROW Team to cut the ribbon. This is a great project because it is bringing a piece of overgrown allotment land back into use with the aim of helping to improve residents' physical and mental health and wellbeing. This initiative is a real asset for our local community.

I should mention that cutting the ribbon can be rather trickier than it sounds. What happens usually, as in this case, the cameraman misses the actual snipping shot, and you have to hold the ribbon back together and pretend to cut it all over again.....so Phillip remember that!

The final engagement I will mention was our recent Civic Celebration & Citizenship Awards Ceremony. As you may know this took place in Murray Hall and it was an honour to have the Deputy Lord Lieutenant Michael Chapman to present the awards.

The Chairman of Essex County Council as well as other mayors, deputy mayors, and chairman from our neighbouring towns were in attendance.

My theme for the Civic Celebration, which was echoed throughout, was "One person can make a difference and everyone should try". This was also well-reflected in my two chosen charities for the event - the Loughton Foodbank and Loughton Citizens Advice Bureau.

This year's very worthy award winners have, each in their own way, all made a very positive difference for local residents. Citizen of the Year went to Sue Taylor – the hugely energetic organizer of the Loughton Festival. The Services to the Community award went to Margaret Weston – a yoga teacher who for over 40 years helped improve our residents' health and well-being. A special Young Caring Citizens award went to the 16th Epping Forest Beavers for their fantastic contribution to the Save Loughton's Green Spaces campaign. They created a set of wonderful drawings, to show their strength of feeling about their greens being built on and lost.

This brings me finally to the issue that has concerned many of us - the District Council's Local Plan.

The Town Council has been very busy researching, collecting the opinions of residents and organising its own response to the plan. It was and still is a mammoth task. We are waiting for the District Council's conclusion to all the submitted responses they received. Should it be necessary, the town council has a war chest should we need to take legal advice on the outcome.

On a more positive note, it's a new beginning for Loughton Town Council. We are about to have a change of scene, with the planned move into Loughton Library imminent. This will mean a more central location and hopefully it will be easier for the local community to contact us when they need to.

And finally I would like to thank everyone who has helped me during my mayoral year - friends, colleagues, Enid our clerk, all her staff for their support and hard work and to everyone who has been so kind, encouraging and supporting as well. Thank you all.

to date but only down from 360 to 344. The plans are still mainly for extensions to existing properties, as most people cannot afford to move within the town so when the family gets larger they increase their living space by extensions on their existing homes.

We do not always approve these extensions, as we need to take into consideration the effect on both neighbours and the street scene as a whole. Some people have unrealistic expectations of what is acceptable to others. There have been some 23 appeals on which we have commented, usually where we are opposing the development and wish to make sure that all the relevant issues are brought to the attention of the inspector who will not be familiar with the town. As usual, some appeals are allowed and some are dismissed.

We always hope that we have played our part in avoiding some of the worst excesses in planning applications. We do, however depend very largely on you, the residents of our town, to do your part in alerting us to any application that you feel is out of keeping or not appropriate in any way. Our meetings almost always run past the allotted time and we have some very late nights when there are a number of contentious applications to discuss and then word our objections.

In the past twenty meetings we have had presentations from the public at nineteen, only on 12 December was no-one present; maybe the date had something to do with it! When we have members of the public wishing to speak we always bring those applications forward in the meeting so that people do not have to listen to all our deliberations.

Licensing applications are fewer in number and we have only had 2 in the past year with 2 for street trading licenses as well.

Enforcement of planning regulations also forms part of our work. As we move about the town we keep our eyes open for anything that is not as it should be. This may be a building under construction for which we did not see an application, something being built not as the plans, or a shop

sign for which no planning consent has been received.

This often results in the errant person being required to put the matter right with the appropriate retrospective planning application.

This year has seen the publication of both the draft District Local Plan and the neighbourhood plan for Chigwell. I am sure that you are aware of the inclusion in the former of several of the lovely green spaces in the Debden part of the town and we are planning for what we may need to do when the comments sent to EFDC are considered and the plan is published early next year. This will then be followed later in the year by the 'examination in public'. We are planning to fight any development to the detriment of our greens with all the tools at our disposal. We already have money set aside for this and more is earmarked from the small increase in our part of the council tax for the coming year. Although the Chigwell plan was rejected by EFDC, sight of it has provided useful information that we may be able to call on in the future.

Without the invaluable support that our planning clerk, Vivienne Messenger who works so hard in keeping on top of all the applications we would have a much harder time. Vivienne is leaving us very shortly to take up a new post as a Democratic Services Officer with EFDC and along with our thanks to her for all her hard work over her time in this role we extend our good wishes for her future in her new position; we will miss her great efficiency in all she does, and her calm and helpful manner.

I would also like to extend my thanks to Cllr Carol Davies, who as well as being town mayor this year has still been a valuable vice chairman; Cllr Phil Abrahams who carries out all the projection of the plans, not an easy task when we want to go back and forth through applications; and to all my fellow committee members for their carefully considered contributions to our meetings. The meetings are frequent and often require us to make site visits before the meeting after we have looked at the plans online at home.

Recreation

CIIr David Wixley

'm pleased to report that for the second year running the Council has received awards from the Essex Playing Fields Association. The Roding Valley Recreation Ground and the Willingale Road Playing Field both received Gold awards while our playgrounds at Westall Road and Traps Hill also received recognition. The new Traps Hill playground gained an additional award as the overall winner resulting in the Council receiving a cheque for £500 as well as a voucher, worth in excess of £500, from Wicksteed, which can be used for a new piece of playground equipment. Our thanks go to the designer of the playground, Helen Sephton-Pike, (Area Sales Manager for SMP), and also to the Project Manager, Maria Cooke. It is disappointing that this playground has suffered from vandalism with repairs costing £1,750.

Further expense has been incurred as a result of travellers camping on the Hillyfields Open Space with re-possession legal and clean-up costs amounting to $\mathfrak{L}3,942$. Most of the Hillyfields Open Space is owned by the Town Council with a smaller section belonging to the City of London. Discussions between those two bodies have taken place on how to

prevent further incursions and, following public consultation, it has been agreed to construct a ditch and a bund. Costs for this work will be shared with the cost to the Council estimated at £1,000. Given time, the scheme should blend in and not be detrimental to the appearance of the site.

Other responsibilities of the Committee include the Willingale Road Nature Reserve and Community Orchard where we are grateful for the work carried out by Epping Forest Countrycare and its volunteers. It was also the venue for a "Mad About Moths" evening with 26 species of moths captured, identified, and released unharmed, including the relatively rare Jersey Tiger moth which is widespread in the Mediterranean but is now being found in the London area.



On the Roding Valley Recreation Ground:

- 5 noticeboards have been installed and we thank Cllr Tom Owen for providing the orientation maps.
- Park Run events on Saturday mornings are attracting an average of 120 participants.
- The Town Council's annual Charity Fun Run will be held on Sunday 14 Mav.
- Further hedgerow planting by Epping Forest Countrycare has taken place to screen walls and deter graffiti.
- Tennis coaching sessions, supported by a £400 grant from EFDC, will begin in April; and
- In the summer it is planned to hold basketball sessions.

The Committee has supported community events including skateboarding in conjunction with the Skate Loughton group, Countdown to Christmas held in The Broadway and the Jessel Green Family Fun Day which this year will be held on Sunday 16 July.

Murray and Kingsley Halls:

- Income for both halls has increased slightly
- Improvements to the Murray Hall include new furniture for the foyer, a new PA system and replacement flooring in the Gents WC.
- A £400 grant from Essex County Council to provide Wi-Fi for hirers has been secured.
- We continue to monitor activities at the Loughton Youth Centre, adjacent to the Murray Hall.
- Repairs to the Kingsley Hall roof have been undertaken and further improvement work planned.

Finally, I thank my fellow Committee members and members of the Community Centre Working Party as well as the Town Clerk and officers, for their hard work and contributions throughout the year.

Environment & Heritage

Cllr Chris Pond

he Committee has continued to deal as fully as possible with issues in its remit, and the following should be particularly noted:

• Allotments – a very high standard in the best allotment competition this year with the winners presented with their prizes at a ceremony at Willingale Road in the autumn. The Pyrles Lane and Roding Road sites had fencing repairs carried out, and the Grow project progressed very well on the Pyrles Lane site where individual plots had become impossible to let some years back.

- Bus Services the Committee expressed grave concern regarding Transport for London's proposal to curtail bus route 167. We responded vigorously to the consultation, but along with the many hundred other objectors, were ignored with the service to Debden withdrawn in early March. We agreed to progress the installation of a new bus shelter in Traps Hill opposite the Library.
- Waste we objected to the proposals by Essex County Council to make changes at recycling centres, whereby DIY waste was to be prohibited. These proposals affected both the Chigwell and Waltham Abbey centres, leading to a 25 mile round trip for Loughton residents to the Harlow centre. We thought the changes might also result in an increase in fly-tipping.
- Banners in the High Road we investigated the possible reuse of the brackets originally installed in 2012 to house the Olympics lamp



column banners in both the High Road and The Broadway, but the company responsible for them wanted to charge far too much for their reuse.

- Local Highway Panel projects we suggested that Public Bridleway no 14 from Forest Way to Woodbury Hill be surfaced with hoggin or similar to City of London requirements, to facilitate pedestrian and equestrian access, and install posts to prevent vehicle encroachment and avoid obstruction. A salt and grit bin is due to be installed at Shaftesbury.
- War Memorial the Remembrance Day ceremony passed off well, with excellent organisation. The WWII memorial from St Mary's Church has been given to the Town Council for safekeeping. This joined the WWI memorials from Lincoln Hall and St Mary's already in storage. Consideration would be given to displaying these in Loughton Library.
- Environmental Issues we have a new standing agenda item that provides an opportunity to discuss concerns and improve the ambience of the town by tackling adverse factors and promoting positive ones. If you know of an eyesore or site that needs attention let us know.
- Air Pollution there are growing worries about air quality on and around Loughton's busy roads. In line with the Council's existing Environmental Policy we propose to:
- Replace our diesel vehicle with a petrol, electric, or hybrid alternative;
- Exert pressure on EFDC to monitor and publicise vehicle pollution levels in the District; and on Essex County Council to include a requirement in their bus contracts for companies to incorporate anti-pollution measures on their vehicles;
- Cease (after a reasonable period) to pay mileage to councillors and if possible council staff for any diesel vehicle journeys;
- Require as a contractual condition our contractors to install particulate filters on any equipment they use (e.g. in grass cutting, site maintenance, etc)
- Where relevant, request similar conditions in planning consents;
- Join with relevant bodies such as the Conservators and local GPs to reduce the levels of pollution;
- · Lobby relevant committees; and
- Encourage residents, when changing their vehicles, to choose the smallest and least polluting non-diesel cars.
- Encourage the provision of charging points for electric vehicles in Loughton.
- Promote these concerns at the forthcoming meeting of the Epping Forest Branch of the ALC and with the EALCs and NALC.

We continue to thank our officers for their encouragement and hard work.

Resources & General Services

Clir Stephen Pewsey

his committee looks after the finances of the Town Council, and monitors our standards and the quality of our public service.

We are committed to the lowest possible precept – that part of the council tax which is allocated to Loughton Town Council – and the highest standards of openness and integrity.

In terms of transparency, the Annual Town Meeting itself is part of the accountability process: the Town Council's magazine Think Loughton goes through the letterbox of all 14,000 homes in Loughton; the Town Council's website has been completely redesigned and relaunched to make it fit for the social media age, the digital generation; and this year the Town Council will be moving to Loughton Library, where it will be more accessible, and fit better with a range of other services as part of a community hub.

In terms of the precept, we have kept it at the same level for the past eight years, at £49.18 per year for a Band D property. Times have been hard for many, and we've made sure that every penny we spend is efficiently used to provide an effective high quality service for the people of Loughton.

In 2017 however, our town faces an unprecedented challenge. The

District Council's draft Local Plan threatens to build houses on our green spaces and on our car parks. A very large public meeting last year and a following Town Council meeting agreed unanimously that we do not want our village greens to be concreted over. We are committed to defending our town by all means necessary, and that costs money. In order to build up a war-chest to fight the plan, we need to increase the precept.

For 2017-18 we have increased the precept to £51.63 per year for a Band D property; an increase of less than 5p a week. Loughton remains a low-tax town, by far the lowest tax town in the district.

The RGS Committee also awards grants to help good causes, and it's been a privilege to partner with the charities and the voluntary sector to help improve town life. These are the people who give up their time and lend a helping hand. These are our friends and neighbours who have made a difference, and we cannot thank them enough.

Finally, on your behalf, I would like to thank my fellow committee members, my Deputy Chair Jill Angold-Stephens, and the Town Council officers, especially the Town Clerk, Enid Walsh, and particularly this year our Deputy Town Clerk, Shirley Haynes for all their work and support throughout the past year.

National Jazz Archive - Loughton's little known treasure

THE ARCHIVE has been based in Loughton Library in Traps Hill since it was founded in 1988, thanks to the support of Essex County Council. Its aim is to ensure that the rich heritage of jazz is safeguarded for future generations of enthusiasts, professionals and researchers. It's a registered charity run almost entirely by volunteers.

The Archive holds the UK's finest collection of written, printed and visual material on jazz, blues and related music, from 1919 to the present, with more than 4,000 reference books, magazines, programmes, posters and photographs.

A Heritage Lottery Fund grant in 2011 for 'The Story of British Jazz' project enabled the collection to be conserved and catalogued for the first time. Many items were digitised and can be accessed online.

As part of the current 'Intergenerational Jazz Reminiscence' project, also funded by HLF,

interviews and reminiscences are being recorded and will be available on the Archive's website and in an exhibition 'Say it with Music' at the Forum in Southend. Among the project partners are the Loughton Youth Project.

Regular fundraising jazz concerts are held, often in Loughton Methodist Church, the next being by the gypsy jazz group Trio Manouche on 24 June and singer and broadcaster Clare Teal on 14 September. A monthly e-newsletter keeps supporters up-to-date with concerts, talks, open days and other activities.

The Archive is open on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday from 10am to 1pm, and more information is available at www.nationaljazzarchive.org.uk

The information can also be submitted via a secure online form at www.crimestoppers-uk.org

Anonymous means that none of the caller's personal details are taken and their calls are not recorded or traced. There are times when someone feels unable to talk to the police

directly and that's why Crimestoppers exists - to provide them with an anonymous route to give information about crime.

Essex Crimestoppers are looking for volunteers to become 'Ambassador Coordinators' to help increase the level of intelligence on crime and criminals that are passed onto the police. The Ambassadors programme is a network of organisations or individuals who work with people who are or have been involved in or have knowledge of crime/criminals. Once these organisations have a clear understanding of the secure and anonymous reporting service that Crimestoppers provides, they will then be able to pass that information onto those people that they work with.

There are many organisations and individuals across Essex that have the potential of becoming

Ambassadors and we are looking for volunteers to identify such organisations in their local community, contact them, agree a meeting date and then present the programme.

The 'Ambassador Coordinators' will receive appropriate training and support for their role. The volunteer should feel comfortable speaking to senior representatives of organisations, have good interpersonal and networking skills and enjoy presenting to groups of people (from 2 to maybe 20 or more).

This is a flexible role in the sense that the volunteer can choose the number of days that they wish to work so long as they are able to commit sufficient time to carry out the role in a timely and professional manner.


