OUR FOURTH family fun run saw almost 130 runners turn out on a Sunday morning in April to support local children's charity, The Dream Factory. Our official starter, town mayor Stephen Pewsey set the runners off along the short 4km course around the Roding Valley Recreation Ground in the spring sunshine.

The first three runners home were Louis Clark (Woodford Green AC and former student of Roding Valley High School), Simon Duggan (Enfield & Haringey AC) and Richard Rumbellow (Loughton Rugby Club).

The first woman home was local fitness instructor Sara Jacobs who had also led the popular pre-run warm up session.

All participants were presented with a medal and the event was also supported by former world boxing champion Colin McMillan and actress and television presenter Lisa Nash, who are both patrons of the charity.

We are grateful for the support from members of the Loughton Athletic Club and Chigwell Air Training Corps who provided stewards along the route and the Red Cross who were on hand in case first aid assistance was required.

The event raised over £760 for the charity, which aims to grant wishes and make dreams come true, to bring hope and happiness to children and young adults aged 3-25 years who have life threatening conditions or severe disabilities.

The run also saw three generations of the Eastwood family complete the course, George (89 years young) with his son and grandson (7) (photo shown on left).



- Who will use it? The interactive map is very easy to use by residents and visitors to Essex who want to find a footpath, bridleway or byway in a specific area of the county.
- Has the map been tested? A range of organisations have tested the map including the Essex Ramblers Association and associated groups; Essex Bridleway Association; Trail Riders Association and members of the Local Access Forum.
- Where can I find the map? At www.essex. gov.uk/highways and accessed through the Public Rights of Way section. Users can zoom in/out and there is also a search facility via postcode; place name or address.

THE WET weather over the past year has increased the rate of erosion along the banks of the river Roding as it flows through Loughton alongside the Roding Valley Recreation Ground on its way to the Thames.

An inspection was carried out in late winter by officers from the town council, the district council and the Essex Wildlife Trust to view the extent of the damage to the banks and identify a strategy to reduce the rate of erosion where appropriate.

We are very grateful to Engineering Officer, Susan Stranders (EFDC) and Nature Reserve Warden, Patrick Bailly (EWT) who have acted speedily to put sustainable measures in place.

Susan has organised the installation of faggotts at some of the worst areas to help restore and stabilize the banks. The faggotts create a mattress of brushwood to disrupt the flow of water and encourage suspended silt deposits to form.

Patrick and his team of volunteers have cleared fallen branches and brash from the river bed to help redirect the flow away from the banks.

The Charlie Moules bridge is also in need of repair works and once reports on options have been completed a decision will be taken jointly by the town council and district who will share the costs of the works.

Citizenship award

AT THE town council's annual Civic Service held in March at the Loughton Methodist Church, town mayor, Stephen Pewsey, presented Mrs Molly Carter with the Citizen of the Year award. Molly was nominated by former councillor, Rose Brooks for her work over many years as chairman of the Oakwood Hill Residents Association and trustee and treasurer of the Epping Forest Mencap charity. She is still very active on Epping Forest District Council's Tenants and Leaseholders Federation.

The EFDC director of housing, Alan Hall, congratulated her and said "Molly has been a real champion for council tenants in Epping Forest for many, many years. She was one of the founding members of our Federation. Her good judgement, wise contributions to debates and wonderful sense of humour have endeared her to her fellow representatives and council officers, as well as council members. There are many tenants and neighbours who have been recipients of her generosity, kind-heartedness and caring approach, so this award is richly deserved.'

We are very grateful to the Rev Tony Morling, minister at the Loughton Methodist Church, who led the service and take this opportunity to wish him well in his new life when he leaves Loughton this summer. Tony who has served the local community since 2004 is returning to Jersey, where he was born, to work at the St Helier Methodist Centre.

Prayers at the service were led by Rev Hugh Taylor of St Mary's Church with readings given by Epping Forest youth councillor Aaron Williams, town councillor Stephen Murray,



county councillor Chris Pond, and Epping Forest MP Eleanor Laing.

St Clare Hospice's chairman of trustees Michael Chapman gave a presentation on the vital work of the charity which benefitted from the collection.

The choir of Whitebridge Junior School led the singing and the service was also attended by the Lord Lieutenant of Essex, Lord Petre, Epping Forest District Council chairman Brian Rolfe and the mayors of Waltham Forest and Redbridge together with local residents.

INSPECTOR Marc Jordan, who was until recently the 999 Response Inspector for the whole of West Essex, is the new District Inspector for Epping, Loughton, Ongar and Waltham Abbey.

This former City of London officer, who has extensive experience working within community teams, said that he is looking forward to tackling the district's biggest

He said: "It will be the biggest challenge of my career to date. That's why I asked for it.

On crime - the biggest issues in the district are burglaries which are increasing year on year, and cross-border crime from London. Burglary is one of the most impactful of all

crimes, and I will be working hard to reinvigorate our neighbourhood watch schemes and ensure my officers are deployed to the right areas in order to deter and arrest these

On Anti-Social behaviour - there are also clear problems around anti-social behaviour in our towns during the evening and early mornings due to the district's popular night clubs and bars; my message is clear, 'please come to Loughton and Epping to enjoy our bars, restaurants and nightclubs but be warned, if you want to swear, litter, urinate or act in another anti-social manner you will be detained and robustly dealt with'.

On community engagement - I am looking forward to increasing community engagement and addressing issues such as nuisance behaviour, especially in Loughton. My team was very successful in this regard in Thurrock. I also hope to attend as many of the neighbourhood police meetings as I can. I wanted to come back into community policing because I find it more of a challenge."





Annual Report 2013

he local elections in May 2012 brought in a new Council to serve Loughton. Many fresh faces were elected, bringing new enthusiasm and creative approaches. The Town Council's role is to help strengthen our community, develop civic pride and a strong sense of belonging. We do this by providing, maintaining and improving facilities such as our children's playgrounds, defending our environment and heritage such as our precious green spaces, and by supporting and promoting a wide range of community organisations and events.

However, our work takes place against a background of a dire worldwide recession. Many families in Loughton are struggling, so our first priority has been to keep the precept (Loughton's share of the Council tax) as low as possible. We keep our costs under continual review and ensure good value for money for what we do. As a result of this careful budget management, the precept has not been increased for four years. Loughton is very much a low-tax town.

Compared with the rest of the country and with other nearby towns, Loughton also has maintained its reputation as being business-friendly. New companies continue to find our town an attractive place to set up and do business. Our retail sector – there are around 300 shops in Loughton – has been relatively strong and, there are only a very few empty premises. There are concerns of course. In the High Road, we need to maintain the right overall mix of shops, coffee bars, eateries, and other businesses. In The Broadway, we need to maintain its family-friendly format, led by independent traders. The High Road also has a strong "evening economy", and while this makes Loughton an attractive place to dine and enjoy a drink, we have to work with other agencies to ensure this does not also attract anti-social behaviour or a creeping "middle of the night" economy. These shopping centres are also residential streets and the people who live there and in the side roads have a right to reasonable peace and quiet.

Loughton's tourism potential is beginning to be recognised, and this could be an important source of future income for the town. On London's doorstep, with good transport links to the capital and bordering the ancient Epping Forest, and good "retail therapy" opportunities, not to mention the "TOWIE" factor, Loughton is well-placed to draw in visitors. This has been recognised for the first time in the 2013 Visit Essex tourist brochure, which now displays Loughton prominently on the county map and recommends it as a destination.

2012 was a year to remember. The Town Council led and promoted events connected with the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and the London Olympics and Paralympics, and won a county-wide award for our Jubilee efforts. Two Loughton residents won silver medals at the Games, and many of us enjoyed the spectacle of the Olympic Torch relay and the games themselves, while others were Olympic volunteers, whose cheerful help became the symbol of "The People's Games". More events are planned for 2013 to ensure another "Summer of Fun" across the town, and we are beginning to think about how to celebrate the Tour de France, which will pass through Loughton in 2014, as well as the more solemn commemoration of the centenary of 1914 and the Great War.

I have been honoured, privileged and humbled to serve as Town Mayor in 2012-13 and it has been a real pleasure to meet so many townsfolk who are working so hard to make Loughton a better place, especially those working with or for our young people who will inherit our legacy.

My thanks go to my fellow Councillors, especially our Deputy Town Mayor, Jill Angold-Stephens, and our officers, through whose unstinting work we maintain our status as a Quality Council.

Planning & Licensing

CIIr Chris Pond

The Planning and Licensing Committee as constituted by the new Council elected in May 2012 comprised four continuing and three new members, so was a good mixture of experience and new thinking. As before, the committee has met every fortnight to consider over 320 planning applications and 15 licensing issues.

As foreshadowed in the 2012 report, a good deal of the committee's time this year has been taken up with considering and commenting on the Planning Authority's new Local Plan as it emerges from discussions and documentation. A major task was confronting several hundred pages of information of the Issues and Options paper issued last summer and attending several workshops at which Cllr Weston was the Committee's representative, and which I also attended.

The Committee is attempting to persuade the District Council to adopt areas of special planning consideration in lieu of extra conservation areas in five parts of Loughton, and is actively seeking revision of the local list of buildings of architectural and historic importance as recommended by the Heritage Asset Review consultants.

The National Planning Policy Framework comes fully into force in April 2013 after a transitional year, and because the new EFDC Local Plan will not be agreed

until 2014 or 2015, there will be a couple of years in which developers may chance their arm with unlikely or undesirable schemes. Your committee will be vigilant for any such cases.

The committee now has an array of technical aids to speed its meetings and better inform its deliberations, including the presentation of plans electronically through a media projector, and the Bing, UK Grid Reference Finder and Google Maps/Street View internet tools. As I mentioned last year the bird's eye feature on Bing is especially useful in considering the impact of rear extensions.

A growing trend we welcome is for public speakers at our meetings, both in favour of and opposing planning applications. A word of advice to anyone involved with a planning application as an applicant or an objector – if you want your views considered by the committee, you have to be quick as there is a 3-week deadline for us to comment. You need to get your comments to us at the latest by the Saturday after you are notified. Don't delay!

We owe much to our indefatigable planning committee clerk, Vivienne Messenger, and to Cllr Jill Angold Stephens for being the laptop operator, and I would like to thank all members of the committee for their attendance and attention to detail.

Environment & Heritage

ollowing the election in May we welcomed 5 new members to the committee. It is refreshing to have their new ideas and views.

■ Allotments

A lot of our time this year, has been spent considering allotments. The Council has 2 sites - one in Willingale Road and one off Roding Road. We are grateful to the volunteers from both sites, who give up their time to run them for us. It has, of course, been a difficult time for gardening because of the weather. Councillors requested a visit to both sites and on the Willingale one were concerned about flooding of some plots and a prevalence of horsetail weed on others. The Willingale managers are working to deal with these. Generally plots are well maintained.

On the other site, councillors were concerned about many empty and under cultivated plots (although some plots are excellent). We requested a meeting with the managers, which was eventually held. They, working with the Council, are trying to make improvements to ensure the allotments are a source of pride to Loughton.

The annual best allotment competition had 20 plots on the short list. It was won by Brian Smith from the Potato Ground, and the runner up was Tom Egan from Willingale Road. Thanks to the judge Amy Pritchard who kindly provided gardening vouchers to all on the shortlist.



■ Christmas

The best dressed Christmas Window competition for shops was won by, for the independents Rose Garden, in Roding Road, for the multiples Mr Simms Sweet Shop, in the High Road, and for the charity shops, Barnardo's, in the Broadway. The judges were very impressed by the number, range and quality of the displays this year. We also added an extension to the Christmas lights on the tree on Kings Green, where the annual Life up a Life service is held.

■ Heritage Plaques

2 new plaques were added to the 32 we already have. One is at 1 Connaught Avenue where Braeside Military Hospital looked after injured soldiers in WW1. The other in Debden Green at Elm Cottage is to artist,

William Brown Macdougall and Margaret Armour, his wife - a writer.

■ Footpaths

Following concerns regarding the closure of the path between Rectory Lane and Borders Lane while the nursing home replacing the Sports Centre is being built, evidence was gathered to confirm its use over 20 years. This enabled the Town Council to apply to the County Council for its registration as a designated footpath.



■ Winter Service

We are very grateful to the almost 50 volunteers around the town who helped with the winter salt/grit programme; this was much appreciated during the bad winter. ECC now only grit main roads and bus routes, but do refill the grit bins annually and provide a delivery of salt to the Town Council to enable some of the pavements and roads in the areas where there are no bins to be gritted. Loughton, with its 7 hills would be much worse off without this help.

■ Loughton Tree Strategy

This has been produced by the District Council, in conjunction with LTC, and is now available on the web. Our thanks go to Chris Neilan from EFDC, Tricia Moxey for the text and John Price for the photos. We plan to print some copies of the strategy for sale.

■ Loughton Cemetery

This takes up a lot of staff time and we are grateful it is maintained and well run. The cemetery chapel was opened to the public on Heritage Open Day along with some other buildings in the town. It is hoped to do this again this year on 12 to 15 September. We are still awaiting changes to legislation before deciding if a new cemetery site is needed.

■ War Memorial

The town's memorial on Kings Green (restored in 2009) is awaiting the addition of extra names with research on-going. It is impressive how every year more and more people attend the service on Remembrance Sunday. The Town Council works closely with the Royal British Legion and Churches Together in Loughton on this.

■ Consultations

This year we have been involved in and supported the Lower Roding catchment plan, the Roding hub - a cycle route to Chigwell via the Roding fields, a 20 mph speed limit in Debden Lane and a memorial rose garden by St Michael's Church. We objected to the Northern Gateway Access Road and the complete closure of Fairmead Road (subsequently only partially closed). We frequently comment on changes to bus routes and standards of service.

Our routine work, like providing the hanging baskets in the town centres, alleyway name plates and maintenance of the drinking fountain continues.

I have thanked a lot of volunteers already but will repeat our appreciation and finally thanks must go to the Town Clerk, her staff and all the committee members for their hard work.

Recreation

CIIr David Wixley

y report starts with our recreation areas.

■ Roding Valley Recreation Ground

The Football Association's Young Player Development Review has been supported by the provision of new mini pitches with a £796 grant from the Football Foundation.

Wooden fencing adjacent to Highwood Lane was renewed by the Harlow Probation Community Service Team and a £1800 government grant.

My 2010 report mentioned an agreement with Loughton Athletic Club for it to convert two tennis courts to an all-weather running track. LAC now has funding for this and, when completed, the track can also be used by the Town Council, which intends to arrange athletic coaching sessions.

Reports were received on the Roding Valley Lake, river bank erosion, Dog Control Orders and the Charlie Moules Bridge. LTC doesn't have responsibility for any of these but will have to contribute to the bridge repairs.

■ Willingale Road Playing Field

A £10,000 Essex County Council Big Society Fund grant will be used, following public consultation, for an outdoor gym.

■ Open Spaces

Six English Oak Trees have been planted on the Hillyfields open space to commemorate Her Majesty the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, an event celebrated by many residents who attended the beacon lighting ceremony on 4 June 2012. Work continues to convert land adjacent to the Willingale Road allotments into a nature reserve thanks to the District Council's Countrycare team and volunteers.

■ Playgrounds

Monksgrove playground has been rebuilt and new equipment installed at the Colebrook Lane play area. A grant of £8,640 for the latter was obtained via the Aiming High for Disabled Children scheme although the equipment is also suitable for able-bodied children.

Our eight playgrounds are inspected by RoSPA and the Register of Play Inspectors every six months.

■ Community Halls

The Murray and Kingsley Halls remain popular with the former generating a higher than expected income.

■ Council Vehicle

The Council's old van has been replaced with a new vehicle being obtained from a local supplier below the anticipated budget.

■ Community Support

The committee supported school holiday activities; skateboarding at the Roding Valley High School and Play in the Park on the Roding Valley Recreation Ground

The inaugural "Santa comes to Loughton" event, an initiative by Cllr Girling (aka Santa Claus) was supported by the committee, local businesses and



churches. We thank local residents whose generous donations provided extra funds for the Chigwell Riding Trust and the Silkworth Trust.

We have assisted the Loughton Youth Theatre by allowing it to use the Willingale Road Playing Field changing rooms.

■ Presentations

The committee's remit includes community safety and we received a presentation on proposed improved CCTV coverage of Loughton High Road from the District Council's Safer Communities Officers.

Other presentations were on the Loughton Centre for Young People (adjacent to the Murray Hall) and Shiners Football Club, which apart from football helps young people with education, life skills, work experience and apprenticeship opportunities. We are pleased that they are using the Roding Valley Recreation Ground as a base.

■ Consultation

We were consulted on the expansion of Hereward School, which we supported but requested that children be encouraged to walk to and from school.

■ Vandalism

I regret to report incidents of vandalism at our playgrounds, tennis courts and the multi-use games area (MUGA). Please report any incidents to the Council on 020 8508 4200 or if witnessed while taking place, the Police 101 number. Information on perpetrators can be reported anonymously via the Crimestoppers number 0800 555111.

Finally I thank the Council's officers and my fellow committee members for their hard work and contributions throughout the past year.

Resources & General Services

CIIr Jill Angold-Stephens

his committee has a strategic role within the Council in that it considers the Council's staffing, goals and policies. It also manages all the statutory obligations and finances.

The most difficult of its tasks is to set the annual precept, that is, the amount that will be paid by each household to the Town Council each year as part of the community charge. Taking into consideration the constraints that all households are facing in the current financial climate we wished, if it were possible, to continue the same rate of precept as had been set for the last three years. We have been successful in this and the Town Council has set a precept for 2013/2014 with no increase on that set for 2012/2013. We shall still provide the same level of service but by careful use of our resources and the fact that EFDC passed on to us the full amount of the new Local Tax Support Grant we have been able to maintain the amount of $\mathfrak{L}49.18$ for Band D properties this year. This makes us cheaper than all the surrounding parishes offering our residents excellent value for money.

Quite the nicest thing that the committee arranges is the annual Christmas Card Design competition with all ages designing a Christmas card for the Town Council. The judging takes place in November to give us time to arrange printing of the overall winner for use by the Council. The winner of each age group receives a voucher and it is very exciting for the overall winner to see their design in print. The 2012 overall winner was Georgia Bentley in the Junior section.

Our other interesting, if challenging, task is to make grants available to

local voluntary organisations ranging from the Citizens' Advice Bureau, for their invaluable advice, to South Loughton Cricket Club for the work that they do with children with disabilities. This year we again received applications for more than double the amount that we were able to give. Our rationale when we are considering grant applications is that all the organisations that receive grants are working with people in Loughton, from small children to the very elderly and those with mental and physical disabilities. This is of great benefit to so many local residents.

It was good to see this year alongside the usual requests from 'Debden Day' to the 'Love Loughton' events there were several new applicants including one for the Cruse Bereavement and those that provide challenging outdoor activities for local scouts. We were also able to continue our support for the busy shop on The Broadway being run by the Restore Church as a community 'drop-in' centre.

Your Councillors could not do their work without a first-class staff team at the Council offices who work tirelessly on behalf of the residents to maintain our Kingsley and Murray halls; produce the town magazine, 'Think Loughton'; deal with planning issues; arrange events including the October half-term skateboarding event and much more.

I would like to finish by thanking the Town Clerk, the Deputy Town Clerk, my deputy chairman, Stephen Pewsey, and all the Councillors who sit on the committee with me for the non-partisan way in which they have worked with me over the past year to make Loughton a good place for us all to live.

DID YOU know that there are an estimated 1,800 people with dementia in the Epping Forest area?

The town council already supports the local branch of the Alzheimer's Society in its work to provide a range of services to support the sufferers and their carers. However, more help is needed as a diagnosis of dementia rarely affects the person alone and has a severe impact on the carers, many of whom may be elderly themselves. The Epping Forest branch of this charity intends to make Loughton and the surrounding area a Dementia Friendly Community where people with dementia and their carers feel supported.

There are many local families facing challenges on a daily basis who may benefit from the following areas of support already provided by the local Alzheimer's Society.


A dementia support worker is available at the Memory Services at St Margaret's Hospital to ensure that people have the support they need from the day they are diagnosed. "This service has been a lifesaver to me," said one local carer. "I had not known where to turn with looking after my mum. To receive information and support helped me immensely."

Following this initial support, families are supported by the society's community dementia support team, who provide understanding, emotional and practical support either over the telephone or by visiting people at home. As one local carer stated "It is reassuring to have someone to talk problems over with. Also the service advises people about the services available when different problems arise as time goes by. I have not had to care for someone with dementia before; it can be very confusing and worrying and I did not know which way to turn. I feel I can pick up the phone and my problems are discussed with ease. It is very helpful."

The society runs a Memory Café from 10am to 12 noon at the Loughton Methodist Church on the first and third Monday of the month. People find meeting with others in the same situation very helpful.

The society already runs a range of community based services for dementia sufferers and their carers and are also launching a new service "Singing for the Brain", which builds upon the singing skills that a person with dementia has retained, often despite having difficulties in communicating the spoken word.

Annual canvass of electors

DID YOU ring, click or text in 2012? If you did, many thanks - you were one of over 15,000 households with no changes to their details which used the telephone, internet or text to confirm their electoral registration details. However, a further 20,000 households COULD have used the automated responses but didn't.

The annual canvass of electors starts on 1 October this year (slightly later than usual) so watch out for the form and deal with it as soon as it arrives.

lan Willett, EFDC's Electoral Registration Officer commented "I would urge everyone, whose details are the same as last year, to use one of the automated responses. I tried it and it's really quick and easy to use. You also get confirmation of your registration rather than wondering if a form sent by post arrived in the office."

Another way to help the council save on costs is to register as soon as you receive the form. Sending out reminders is a costly exercise especially where there are no changes to the details. People think that because their details are the same they don't have to register. Yes you do - you have to register by confirming your details every year."
